It has been a pleasure (for the most part), to be the editor of the newsletter for all but 2 issues since 1975. It has been an honor to be president of the association for eight (or was it ten?) of the last fourteen years. The newsletter was relatively easy because of the ever helpful direction given by the irascible (but secretly soft-hearted) Jerry Cohen, who

has been the printer of the newsletter since 1973. The newsletter found its own rhythm and definitely needs the new stewardship of Lois Lane, Brenda Starr, and our cub reporter. They are known to others as Maureen Garrett McElhinney, Bernadette

Fleming Hemmer, and Sue Faggiani, all members of the class of '68. I know they will bring a breath of fresh air and a renewed perspective to the newsletter. I urge all of you who can contribute to help them by sending information and articles to them. Stop writing on Facebook and send your contributions!

As for the Presidency, it certainly has not been uneventful. During my second year, we saw the closing of the school. That closing necessitated the revamping of the charter of the association and all the legal rigmarole that came with the changes. Not long after, Mary Ann Dono '60, who had been our Secretary Treasurer for many years, was killed in a tragic accident. The following year, our nation suffered the horrific terrorist attack of 9/11, with the Twin Towers destroyed just two blocks from our luncheon site.

As the nearest Level one trauma center, the hospital and its staff waited to treat survivors who never made it. At

> And of course, there was the final blow, the closing of our beloved hospital in 2010. Those of us in the New York area who pass by Seventh Avenue and 12th Street are watching what seems to be the

stealth demolition of the institution many of us called home - as brick by brick the structures are being removed.

I know that our Alumnae are always there for each other. Nowhere is it more evident in those who head the committees and serve on the board. I fear forgetting to mention anyone, but I want to point to Mary Ann McLaughlin '57, who in the wake of 9/11 found us another venue for our luncheon. This year, no epic feats

Former OR Nurse Sheila Lenahan Boyle '58 Visits Haiti

In 2003 Sheila Lenahan Boyle 58' heard a Franciscan friar speak about a medical mission group called "The Light of the World Charities." Intrigued by his message, she contacted the group for more information. The Light of the World Charities is an organization made up primarily of volunteers from the health and medical communities. They provide medical, surgical and dental care to the poor and sick of the world.

Sheila has been a nurse since 1958 and the last 18 years were spent at St. Vincent's Hospital in the Operating Room. Sheila was a good fit for this group. In 2008 and 2009 Sheila went to Honduras for one week where she worked in a simple but well equipped hospital.

This team concentrated mostly on cleft palate repair. In 2010 she went to Haiti. There they experienced a much more primitive set of circumstances as well as a higher degree of danger for the staff. However, they did 25 cases without incident. Sheila returned to Haiti in January and plans to return again December 2012.

Her enthusiasm for her work and in particular this mission is an inspiration to us all.

Rosemary Queenan Cawley, Class of 1936


Rosemary Cawley passed away on July 13, 2012. She worked in St. Luke's-Roosevelt Hospital until she entered the army in 1942. Ro worked at the 9th Army Evacuation Hospital, serving during World War II in the campaigns to liberate North Africa, Sicily, and the Italian peninsula. She was honorably discharged in 1946, always proud of her service to her country.

Ro met her husband, Patrick, while working at St Vincent's and they had 7 children. She later worked as a school nurse and after the death of her husband, volunteered as an oncology nurse in Brick, New Jersey.

Sister Catherine Shean, MMS, Class of 1937

Sister Catherine Shean, M.M.S. who served for more than 40 years in Africa as well as the western United States, died October 1, 2012 at St. Joseph's Manor in Philadelphia. She was 97.

Sister Catherine was a nursemidwife in Ghana, Kenya, Nigeria and Malawi. She also served in New Mexico, California and Arizona. Raised in the Bronx, she graduated from St. Vincent's Hospital in Manhattan as a registered nurse in 1937. She entered the Medical Mission Sisters in 1943 and professed yows in 1945.

Brian Robert Bill, Son of Pat Davis Parry '71

On August 6, 2011, Chief Special Warfare Operator (SEAL) Brian Robert Bill, was killed when the helicopter he was riding in with 29 other American soldiers, 16 of them SEALS, was shot down in Afghanistan.

Brian was a remarkably gifted, thoughtful, and compassionate young man. loved life; he loved a challenge; he was fearless and had boundless energy; and, he was passionate about being a SEAL. He loved and respected his SEAL teammates.

Brian was a man of courage and passion. He was confident, daring and skilled, yet compassionate and loving. He was also a man of faith, a devout Catholic. He was driven to excel for personal pride and his love of family, God, and country. He was a private and humble man who never sought personal embellishments or recognition.

One person writing to Brain's parents included this quote from Thucydides, "The bravest are surely those who have the clearest vision of what is before them - glory and danger alike - and notwithstanding, go on to meet it." A Lieutenant in the Navy said, "He's like no one I ever met before and probably will ever meet again in my lifetime." A teammate wrote: "I knew him as an unassuming SEAL with an insatiable appetite for new horizons. He epitomized the quiet professional. "

Brian was a treasured son, grandson, brother, cousin, uncle, teammate and friend. He was the best of us and we miss him every day.

Melanie Anne Carsten, 56, of New York City, died Sunday, November 4, 2012 after a brief, unexpected illness. After working in the corporate world for several years, Melanie decided to change careers. She enrolled and graduated with high honors from St. Vincent's Nursing School in 1985 and began a twentyfive year career in critical care nursing at New York-Presbyterian Hospital in New York City. Her compassion for her patients was ever present. Her love of dogs in general, and in particular her dog, MacGregor, prompted her involvement with the pet therapy program at her hospital. Melanie's gifts and talents extended beyond the walls of the hospital and will be missed by all.
