Along with new beginnings the 50th anniversary class gave their remarks along with a slide show put to music current for the time they were students. It was terrific! Unfortunately you had to be there to appreciate the feeling of camaraderie and pride that was in the room.

Now here are the remarks from Peg McCue Correa, class of 1969.

Good Morning, I want to acknowledge and honor Sister Miriam Kevin.

Sister Kevin, you tolerated and endured your time spent with the Class of 1969.

And today we also acknowledge and celebrate the proud graduates of St. Vincent's Hospital





School of Nursing, the Class of 1969, this, our 50 year Anniversary. It began on Friday the 13th, June, 1969 when we received our pins from Cardinal Terence Cooke at St. Patrick's Cathedral. On that day we became part of the legacy and history of St. Vincent's Hospital School of Nursing, New York City, which began 127 years ago, in 1892.

And, thank you to the Reunion Team who worked to put this gathering together: Carolyn Chiusano, Harriet McGreal, Janice Bossone, Mary Farrell, Pam Noonan, Elise Ognibene, Donna Pecoraro, and Margaret Ann Troy,

The time we were in school, the years of 1966 through 1969, this time begs to be placed in context in the midst of what was happening in the world. Those years were among the most turbulent and contentious in the US history.

Foremost were the protests against the Vietnam War and living in the Village placed us in the middle of peace marches, candlelight vigils in Washington Square Park ---students were marching in the streets, moving into university buildings, taking them over and occupying them. At 158 West 12th Street, although we lived in prime protest territory, we were sheltered. It also helped that early in our Freshman Year we carried 16 subjects, from Communication Skills to Physics to Inorganic Chemistry. So, our protests included beating our curfews, our escape route was through the ER, where we managed to elude our housemother's vigilant eyes.

Junior Year, the 9th Floor, broke the rules of dormitory living. Nightly we hung a bed sheet that named ex-boyfriends and soon to be ex-boyfriends. And our penalty was to forfeit dorm life for two weeks and in exchange we commuted from home to class and duty.

Senior Year an anonymous student editor created our own underground newspaper which mysteriously appeared in the mailboxes. The editor called herself Atla Pendleton. The paper reported on our instructors, their comings and goings and gave us a peek at their social life. Also in Senior Year we rented the Maritime Building and organized a hugely successful Beer Bash, in spite of the fact that Sister Robert hated our flyers that proclaimed "Beer Bash" and she insisted we change them to "Maritime Mixer". (We borrowed our instructors cars and drove to Manhattan College, St. Peters, St Francis, and Fordham to promote this undertaking, Joan

Caruana regained her normal vital signs when her new VW beetle was returned unscathed.)

Reflecting back on those years and when we consider our tender ages of 18, 19, 20, we lived two lives. We possessed an abundance of energy and hopes and aspirations, along with our share of apprehensions. Our lives, the ones as typical 18, 19, 20 year olds, expressed themselves in visits to McCoys, The Red Garter, The Stone Jug Pub, we were determined to create a social life. And, if you did have a date, the Beau Parlor was yours for the taking. Our other life was when we channeled that energy and exuberance and commitment





when we walked into that Hospital, onto St. Joseph's, St. Lawrence and St. Therese. During Junior Year, you knew who was working shift and nights when you entered the cafeteria and saw fellow classmates eating, dressed in their raincoats.

Here today are classmates who have traveled from California, Washington State, Wisconsin, Georgia, Florida, Delaware, New Hampshire, Vermont, Massachusetts, Connecticut, this is a testament to friendship. It is a tribute to the challenges and responsibilities we shared at the tender ages of 18, 19 and 20.




